Do Not "Waver in a Lack of Faith"

Considering the circumstances of the patriarch Abraham, some may feel that he had legitimate grounds for doubt. It may appear quite reasonable to conclude that he was 'beyond hope of becoming the father of many nations'-despite God's promise. Why? Well, from a purely human point of view, things did not look promising. 'He considered his own body, now already deadened, and also the deadness of the womb of Sarah,' the Bible record says. Still, he resolutely refused to allow doubts about God and his promises to take root in his mind and heart. The apostle Paul writes: "He did not grow weak in faith," or "waver in a lack of faith." Abraham remained "fully convinced that what [God] had promised he was also able to do." (Romans 4:18-21) He had built a strong, personal, trusting relationship with Jehovah over many years. He rejected any doubts that might have weakened that relationship.

(Romans 5:4, 5) 4 endurance, in turn, an approved condition; the approved condition, in turn, hope, 5 and the hope does not lead to disappointment; because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the holy spirit, which was given to us.

• At Romans 5:3-5, why did the apostle Paul list hope at the end of a series?

Paul presented a series of things that Christians experience—tribulation, endurance, approved condition, and hope. This "hope" is not the initial hope that one gains from the Bible, but it is the strengthened, deepened, pervading hope that a Christian can gain over time.—12/15, pages 22-3.

6 Another sustaining power in our lives is the hope that God has set before us. As Paul put it: "Let us enjoy peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom also we have gained our approach by faith into this undeserved kindness in which we now stand; and let us exult, based on hope of the glory of God. And not only that, but let us exult while in tribulations, since we know that tribulation produces endurance; endurance, in turn, an approved condition; the approved condition, in turn, hope, and the hope does not lead to disappointment."—Romans 5:1-5.

7 Tribulations in themselves are not joyous, yet the peaceable fruits that they yield afterward are. These fruits are endurance, an approved condition, hope, and the fulfillment of that hope. Endurance by us will lead to our receiving divine approval. When we have God's approval, we can confidently hope for the realization of the promises he has made. This hope holds us true to our course and buoys us up under tribulation until the hope is fulfilled.—2 Corinthians 4:16-18.

(Rom. 6:12) We could "let sin continue to rule" by doing whatever our imperfect body moves us to do. Because we can "let" sin rule or refuse to let it rule, the question is, What do we really want at heart? Ask yourself: 'At times, do I let my imperfect body or mind point me in a bad direction and then go there? Or am I dead with reference to sin? Am I living with reference to God by Christ Jesus?' It really comes down to how much we appreciate the undeserved kindness God has shown by forgiving us.

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
